Good afternoon,

Governor Murphy reminded all retail businesses, including essential manufacturing operations, that while they remain open, they must be following CDC Business Guidance and Social Distancing Guidance. The Office of the Governor is receiving a lot of complaints that companies, including manufacturers, are not practicing proper protocol while they are open. In our briefings, we warned our members that the online site will make it easier for essential employees to share complaints, even if unfounded. Please, ensure you are following all protocols.

In response to the increase violation complaints, the state launched an online FAQ page to provide further guidance on Social Distancing.

The state is strongly requesting manufacturing companies to make their best effort to reduce staff on site to the minimal number necessary to ensure that essential operations can safely continue.

Governor Murphy once again mentioned the private sector PPE inventory which are due by 5 PM today. All businesses (<u>even companies deemed essential</u>) and non-hospital health care facilities in possession of PPE not required for the provision of critical health care services, are required to submit information about their inventory at <u>covid19.nj.gov/ppereport</u>. Under <u>Executive Order 109</u> Section 7.

NEW JERSEY DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

As a follow-up to the recommended list of regulatory waivers and extensions submitted to the NJDEP on March 25, 2020, CCNJ connected with DEP leadership and they acknowledged and appreciated the industry coalition's letter. Though no specifics are confirmed at this time, NJDEP is currently working on a Department-wide policy statement to address stakeholder concerns. We will keep members updated as new information is shared with us.

EPA ANNOUNCES ENFORCEMENT DISCRETION POLICY FOR COVID-19 PANDEMIC

EPA announced a temporary policy regarding EPA enforcement of environmental legal obligations during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Please note that this policy excludes Superfund and RCRA Corrective Action.

The temporary policy makes it clear that EPA expects regulated facilities to comply with regulatory requirements, where reasonably practicable, and to return to compliance as quickly as possible. To be eligible for enforcement discretion, the policy also requires facilities to document decisions made to prevent or mitigate noncompliance and demonstrate how the noncompliance was caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. This policy does not provide leniency for intentional criminal violations of law.

COVID-19 UPDATE: CHEMICAL FACILITY ANTI-TERRORISM STANDARDS

Effective March 26, 2020: In response to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) is **postponing and rescheduling nearly all Chemical Facility Anti-Terrorism Standards (CFATS) authorization inspections, compliance inspections, and other onsite visits, such as compliance assistance**.

The CFATS regulations remain in force, and facilities must continue to comply with 6 C.F.R. part 27. High-risk chemical facilities with approved Site Security Plans/Alternative Security Programs (SSP/ASP) are required by Federal law to continue to implement the security measures in those plans. Facilities should consider compensatory measures to secure their critical assets in cases where designated personnel are unable to perform their security duties due to illness or quarantine.

"STAY AT HOME" EXECUTIVE ORDER 107

The "Stay at Home" **Executive Order No. 107** remains in full effect. **"Manufacturing, industrial, logistics, ports, heavy construction, shipping, food production, food delivery, and other commercial operations may continue to operate...."**

Governor continues to remind the private sector that even though the E.O. deems manufacturing and other businesses essential, social distancing and CDC guidelines must be followed.

While this is not a concern for our industries that have been deemed essential, just be aware that the state has set up a <u>website</u> where employees can report a possible violation of <u>Executive Order No. 107</u> using an online form. The form goes into OEM, and they will then verify the information. There has been a big increase in complaints, and the governor spent a lot of time discussing this issue today.

Employees reporting to work are permitted to travel to and from their place of business. Businesses are encouraged to give each employee a letter indicating that the employee works in an industry permitted to continue operations. Essential employees should have the company letter, and company ID accessible while driving to and from work, so they can present it with their license if necessary. We suggest the <u>DHS Guidance to help with the letter</u>.

PRIVATE SECTOR ESSENTIAL EMPLOYEE REGISTRATION PROJECT

OEM is developing a temporary process to help get critical infrastructure sites approved faster and provide essential employees with a temporary essential employee verification document that will expire in August 2020. Companies that get the temporary approval will then be required to take a training course in September to be able to maintain essential status and provide permanent cards to essential employees.

OEM will still require that you identify the number of employees that are essential. Remember, the state has instructed all businesses, including manufacturing deemed essential, to maintain social distancing and CDC guidelines, and have on site the minimal amount of staff required for safe operations.

CCNJ will update members once the temporary process is established.






