Coronavirus (COVID-19) Information

Update 16: April 2, 2020

Good afternoon.

Governor Murphy has signed an <u>executive order</u>, invoking the powers of <u>the Disaster Control Act</u>, formally authorizing Col. Colonel Patrick J. Callahan, New Jersey State Police Superintendent, in consultation with the commissioner of the NJ Department of Health, to commandeer medical supplies and equipment necessary to the State's COVID-19 response. Medical supplies include, but are not limited to, N95 masks, other personal protective equipment, and ventilators.

According to <u>E.O. 113</u>, "the state has made and continues to make all reasonable efforts to procure medical resources from the federal Strategic National Stockpile, FEMA, existing State caches of supplies, individual and corporate donations, and through traditional private sector purchasing, but despite these efforts, there remains a critical shortage of medical resources in the state."

Based on previous conversations with the administration and press conferences, it is our belief that this will be used as a last resort effort to commandeer medical supplies and equipment from private companies. It is also likely that medical offices that were deemed closed and non-essential by <u>E.O. 109</u>, are more likely to cooperate with the state knowing that the NJSP now has the power to commandeer their supplies, if the state is unable to reach an agreement to acquire PPE with those entities.

We still believe that in most cases as it relates to our member companies that complied with E.O. 109, Section 7, that this is a last resort effort and the state will work with companies to acquire excess PPE without disrupting operations; however, if the situation worsens, E.O. 113 clearly makes hospitals and health professionals a priority.

If products are commandeered, Compensation shall be provided following the procedures established by the Disaster Control Act, <u>N.J.S.A. App. A:9-51</u>.

We will continue to encourage the administration to work with private companies to acquire PPE in a way that does not disrupt operations.

Reminder to our member companies that qualify as small businesses, tomorrow at **9AM**, the **New Jersey Economic Development Authority (NJEDA) will launch the application for its Small Business Emergency Assistance Grant Program.** A link to the grant program application will be posted on the State's <u>COVID-19 Business Information Hub</u>. The grant program is part of a <u>package of initiatives announced last week</u> to support businesses and workers facing economic hardship due to the outbreak of the novel coronavirus COVID-19.

"STAY AT HOME" EXECUTIVE ORDER 107 STILL IN PLACE

As mentioned at the start, the "Stay at Home" **Executive Order No. 107** remains in full effect. "Manufacturing, industrial, logistics, ports, heavy construction, shipping, food production, food delivery, and other commercial operations may continue to operate...."

Governor continues to remind the private sector that even though the E.O. deems manufacturing and other businesses essential, social distancing and CDC guidelines must be followed at those locations.

Employees reporting to work are permitted to travel to and from their place of business. Businesses are encouraged to give each employee a letter indicating that the employee works in an industry permitted to continue operations. Essential employees should have the company letter, and company ID accessible while driving to and from work, so they can present it with their license if necessary. We suggest the DHS Guidance to help with the letter.

PRIVATE SECTOR ESSENTIAL EMPLOYEE REGISTRATION PROJECT

OEM has established a temporary process to help get critical infrastructure sites approved faster and provide essential employees with a temporary essential employee verification document that will expire in August 2020.

Any CCNJ member company that is deemed <u>critical infrastructure</u> by the Manufacturing and Chemical Sector section in the CISA document, and is not in the system, but would like to be considered for the temporary program, please email Elvin Montero with your contact information.




