Coronavirus (COVID-19) Information

Update 7: March 20, 2020

Good afternoon,

While Governor Murphy enacted no new measures today at his daily press briefing, he alluded that tomorrow he's "tightening the screws" on social distancing in the state and taking more aggressive measures. It is not clear what the governor has in mind, but likely to follow some of the actions enacted by <u>New York</u> and <u>Pennsylvania</u>.

The governor of Pennsylvania even went a step further and provided of list of what the state considers "<u>life-sustaining businesses</u>."

Governor Murphy is stressing more than ever for all New Jerseyans to stay home, especially if their work allows them to work from home and are not directly involved with COVID-19 response.

Yesterday, we urged our membership to allow for teleworking wherever possible, because we expected more strict mandates coming down the road. Our poll results show that at least 80% of our membership is working from home. For those critical and essential workers who can't work from home, the state is still recognizing their roles to be essential. <u>E.O. 104</u> states that the occupancy limit does not apply to normal operations at office environments, factories, assemblages for the purpose of industrial or manufacturing work. And OEM confirms that currently there are no restrictions on manufacturing facilities and critical infrastructure operations.

Yesterday we provided the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency's (CISA) <u>guidance</u> to help state and local jurisdictions and the private sector identify and manage their essential workforce while responding to COVID-19. New Jersey is expected to refer to this guidance as they take more drastic measures.

We will provide an update tomorrow once we know the conditions imposed by the expected changes to E.O. 104. We do not want to speculate on what it may contain.

CCNJ has been in constant contact with the NJ Department of Environmental Protection regarding permits, monitoring, inspections and remediation approvals:

- We are asking the state and DEP for a blanket extension of permit and remediation deadlines similar to the Permit Extension Act.
- We have submitted to DEP a list of specific items we would like extended.
- We have referred the orders issued by Maryland and Louisiana which have also implemented extension orders.
- We have notified DEP that our facilities are very concerned about letting DEP inspectors on their properties without knowledge of what the department is doing to

assure that the inspectors have not been infected and/or have not come into contact with a suspected infected person.

We have also learned that OSHA is developing a comprehensive list of compliance/enforcement relief, and we can expect to see it early next week.

As expected, there is a backlog getting new companies registered into the **Private** <u>Sector</u> <u>Essential Employee Registration Project</u>. Just a reminder this is a program for Critical Infrastructure facilities. <u>Please, do not forward my email to your service providers, as I</u> <u>will not be able to get them access to the program at this time.</u> OEM did reach out this afternoon and confirmed they are still working on the four lists CCNJ has provided. We ask for everyone's patience with this if you have submitted your request and haven't heard from OEM.

We suggest that you continue to remind your employees to have their work ID accessible while driving to and from work, so they can present it with their license if necessary.

As always, if there are any issues or concerns, we are not addressing in these updates, please do not hesitate to contact CCNJ staff about them. We have been working diligently with state and local officials, including members of both the New Jersey Legislature and U.S. Congress and the Governor's Office to identify ways that they can be helpful to the business of chemistry during this time.





So first, since yesterday, we have received 318 new positive test results, six of those through the DOH labs and the other 312 through our private sector and healthcare provider networks. Our statewide total is 742. If you added yesterday's to 318, you might get a different number and that's just going to be the case, folks. We're going to have duplicates, we're going to have folks who may have been out-of-staters who got tested in New Jersey for whatever reason. The official number is now 742. Those numbers will be released as soon as they're available. As I said to you yesterday, because of the VTC that we have with the White House, we're doing this press gathering earlier in the day, which means it's a little bit more of a scramble for Judy and her team to get the right numbers, although we've got them, she'll go through those numbers by counties.

Regional Coalition Requests a Direct Cash Assistance Program of At Least \$100 Billion in Response to Financial Impact of COVID-19

As part of a coordinated regional effort to combat COVID-19, New Jersey Governor Phil Murphy, New York Governor Andrew Cuomo, Connecticut Governor Ned Lamont, and Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf today urged the federal government to consider a fiscal stimulus in the form of a direct cash assistance program to provide an immediate financial infusion to all four states to help cover costs related to COVID-19 response operations.
